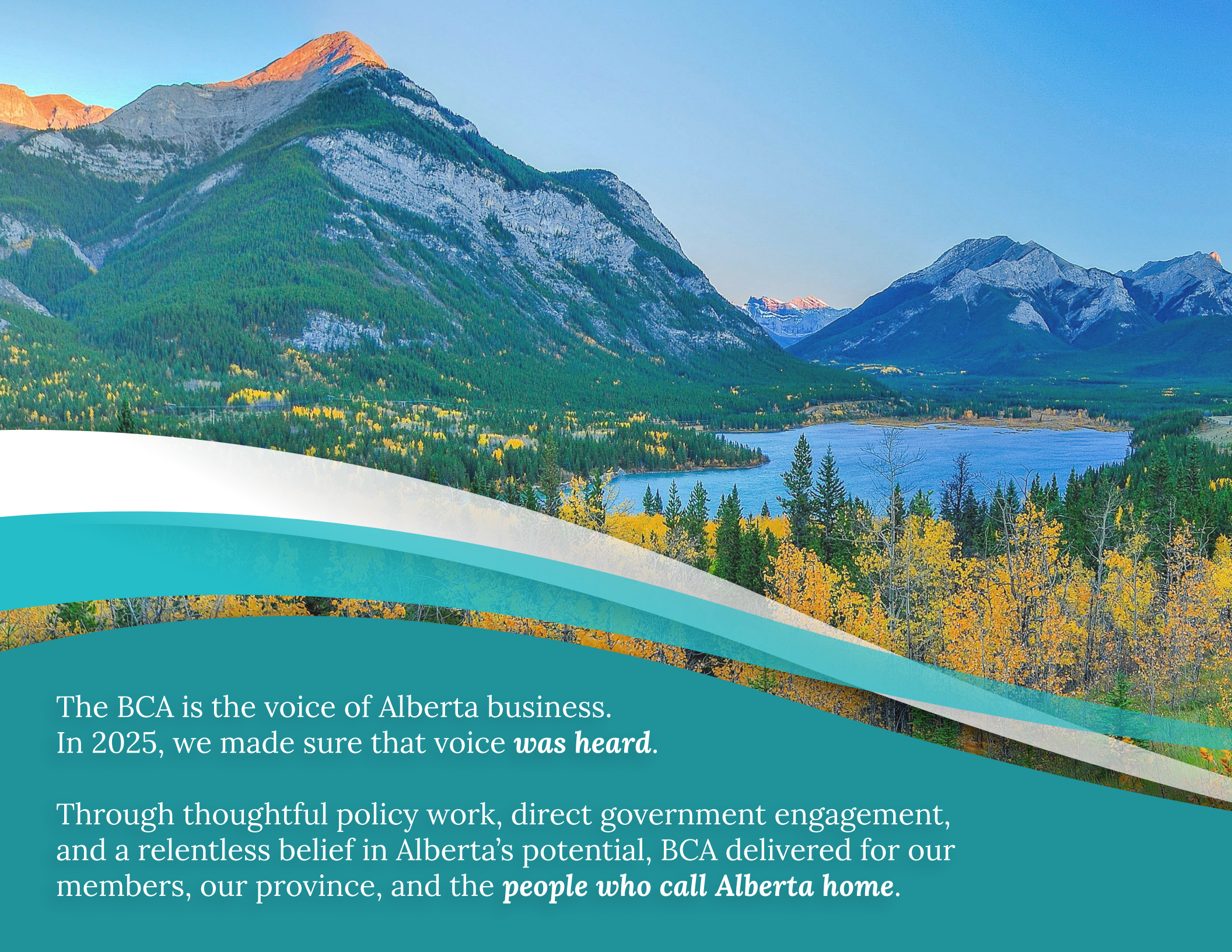

OPENING MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR AND PRESIDENT

A Year of Resilience, Change, and Results

The past year tested Alberta's resilience and our economy as geopolitical tension, slowing national growth, and shifting trade relationships demonstrated that competitiveness, investment confidence, and economic opportunity could not be taken for granted.

While it was a year of change, it proved what a focused, determined team can accomplish when the stakes are high.

2025 started with a bang. From the moment Prime Minister Trudeau resigned in January 2025, BCA was flat out advocating for the interests of Alberta's private sector, researching, writing, commenting and engaging deeply throughout the year.

The result was the most productive year in BCA's history, with ten major policy and report outputs delivered — 3.5 times our annual target. These reports included [A Strong Canada, A Good Life](#), our federal election platform; [Untapped Potential](#), our natural resources policy platform developed jointly with the four western provincial business councils through the Western Business Coalition; [Laying the Foundation](#), our skilled trades supply strategy; the first two reports from our [From Barriers to Breakthroughs](#) project; and [Municipal Matters](#), our local government platform ahead of Alberta's 2025 municipal elections.

The impact was tangible: we **influenced 24 government decisions**, 50% higher than in 2024, and did **211 media interviews**, resulting in **4,217 news stories**.

As escalating tariff measures heightened uncertainty across Canada, we worked directly with our members to understand the impacts of U.S. tariffs, briefed Alberta ministers and the province's U.S. office, and engaged with U.S. state chambers whose economies are closely linked to ours, to drive a common message on restoring our long-standing free trade relationship.

Now, BCA enters 2026 with an ambitious agenda. We will continue advancing Alberta's economic interests across key and emerging sectors, deepen our focus on trade and investment, and pursue long-term policy reforms that strengthen competitiveness and help restore investor confidence.

To our members, our board, and our partners, thank you for your continued support. Together, we are advancing the ideas that support growth, unlock opportunity, and build a stronger future for Alberta and Canada.

GOVERNMENT ADVOCACY AND DECISIONS INFLUENCED

Decisions Influenced

- ➔ The Canada-Alberta MOU on energy and climate policy marked a significant step forward in federal-provincial collaboration, one shaped in part by BCA's advocacy on natural resources and competitiveness.
- ➔ The establishment of the Major Projects Office, a long-standing BCA recommendation first advanced through [Future Unbuilt](#), will accelerate major project approvals until more material changes to the system can be made.
- ➔ Amendments to federal greenwashing provisions are moving ahead, rolling back some of the most unworkable elements of legislation that prevented companies from communicating about their environmental performance.
- ➔ The federal government's recalibration of immigration levels to better align with labour market needs and absorptive capacity reflected ideas that BCA had been advancing through its multi-year immigration work.
- ➔ Significant provincial investment in expanding Alberta's skilled trades workforce followed directly from BCA's advocacy through [Laying the Foundation](#).
- ➔ And at the municipal level, many of the early commitments made by newly elected mayors and councils across Alberta, including on fiscal discipline and community safety, reflect the priorities BCA advanced through [Municipal Matters](#).



Ongoing Policy Focus

Not all of BCA's most important work in 2025 produced immediate policy change, but it did produce real and meaningful progress on some of the toughest files Alberta's business community faces.

On trade, BCA moved quickly when the U.S. administration's tariff actions created significant uncertainty for members. The BCA worked directly with members to understand the impacts, provided direct briefings to Alberta ministers and the province's U.S. office, participated in Alberta's Trade Advisory Task Force and the Canada-U.S. Trade Council, and engaged with U.S. state chambers whose economies are closely tied to Alberta's — building alignment around a common message on restoring trade certainty and the long-term importance of Canada-U.S. diplomacy.

On federal legislation, BCA continued its fight against Bill C-69, supporting the Government of Alberta and its second court challenge against this problematic legislation.

And through BCA's *From Barriers to Breakthroughs* project, we began building the evidence base to address the systemic obstacles — regulatory, structural, and policy-related — that continue to constrain Canada's investment climate and competitiveness. This project will also be a major focus of 2026.

These are not quick victories, but BCA will continue our persistent and steadfast advocacy on behalf of Alberta's business community to ensure the province's competitiveness.







MAJOR PROJECTS 2025



Strengthening Alberta's National Influence

Ahead of the 2025 federal election, BCA recognized a critical opportunity to shape the national policy agenda on behalf of Alberta's business community. BCA developed [A Strong Canada, A Good Life](#) — a federal election platform articulating Alberta's private sector priorities for Canada's next government across competitiveness, energy, trade, and prosperity.

Simultaneously, BCA partnered with the business councils of British Columbia, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba through the Western Business Coalition to release [Untapped Potential: Driving Canadian Prosperity through Natural Resources](#) — a pre-election roadmap for unlocking Canada's natural resource opportunity and restoring the country's economic confidence on the world stage. This was the first major collaborative policy output from the Western Business Coalition, representing the unified voice of western Canadian business.

Key Impact

These two works shifted federal understanding of Alberta's economic realities at a pivotal moment in the country's political cycle. Together, they helped build the case for a more productive federal-provincial relationship and contributed to influencing elements of the Canada-Alberta MOU, which is considered one of the most significant agreements between the two governments in recent years.

Improving Canada's Talent and Workforce Systems From Promise to Practice

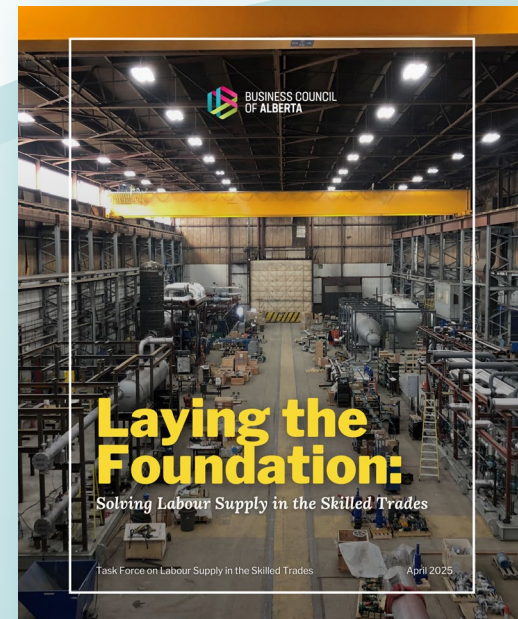
Building on BCA's multi-year body of work on immigration and workforce policy, 2025 saw BCA move from research and recommendations to real-world impact.

[*From Promise to Practice: Improving Immigrant Success to Drive Prosperity in Alberta*](#) advanced BCA's proposal for a prosperity-driven immigration system, playing a meaningful role in the federal government's recalibration of immigration levels to better align with actual labour market needs; resulting in a significant policy shift with long-term implications for Alberta and Canada. BCA also influenced labour agreement decisions at the federal level, further demonstrating the reach of our workforce policy advocacy.

At the provincial level, [*Laying the Foundation: Solving Labour Supply Challenges for the Skilled Trades*](#) made the case for investment in growing Alberta's skilled trades workforce. The report helped drive provincial commitment to expanding trades training and supply. This work is not just an economic priority, but a practical necessity as increasing both the short- and long-term supply of skilled workers will be critical for the major infrastructure projects Alberta and Canada must build in the coming years.

Key Impact

This body of work not only brought about a return of immigration levels to more reasonable levels but also enabled Alberta to continue to play a role in economic immigrant selection through the Provincial Nominee Program and support our workforce through renewed labour market agreements. Finally, virtually every member of the BCA struggles with finding sufficient skilled trades, and our work nudged the provincial government to make meaningful investments in growing the short- and long-term supply of skilled workers.





Identifying the Barriers to Investment and the Cost of Inaction

The first report in the *From Barriers to Breakthroughs* series, [*Early Steps to Unlock Canada's Investment Potential*](#) identified the regulatory, structural, and policy barriers that constrain investment, innovation, and competitiveness in Alberta, making the case for meaningful reform and laying the groundwork for the policy changes needed to unlock Canada's full economic potential.

The second report, [*The High Cost of Low Investment*](#), quantified the economic consequences of inaction, demonstrating the real and growing cost to Alberta and Canada of failing to address these barriers while strengthening the urgency of BCA's reform agenda.

Key Impact

Together, these two reports have set the stage for meaningful policy, regulatory and legislative change needed to make Canada a more attractive and competitive place to invest in major projects, which will be essential if Canada is to grow its economy, prosperity and global position.



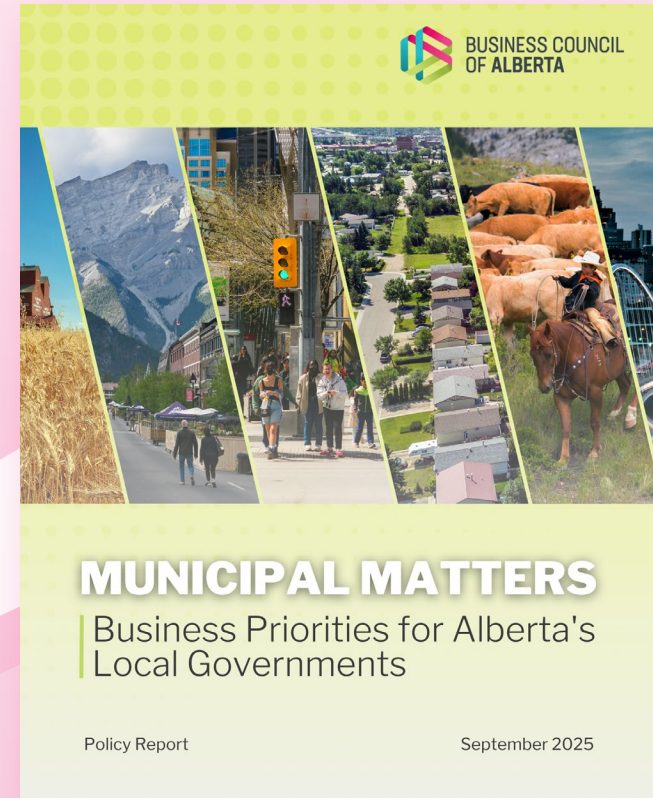
Supporting Stronger Municipal Leadership

Alberta's cities and communities are where business is built, employees and their families live, and prosperity is felt most directly. Ahead of the 2025 municipal elections, BCA convened a member task force to define what strong local leadership looks like and to give Alberta's business community a voice in shaping it.

The result was [*Municipal Matters: Local Government Priorities from Alberta Business Leaders*](#) — a set of clear priorities for Alberta's local governments developed by, and for, the province's leading chief executives. The report recommendations stressed tackling crime and safety, improving development approvals and ensuring better governance and fiscal discipline.

Key Impact

Many of the early commitments being made by newly elected mayors and councils across Alberta reflect the recommendations advanced by BCA members. A clear demonstration that BCA's influence extends into communities as well as provincial and federal corridors.

- ➔ 88% of Albertans say they have the opportunity to live a good life

Where Focus is Needed

- ➔ GDP per capita down 2.3% as population growth outpaces output
- ➔ Infrastructure investment not keeping pace with rapid growth
- ➔ Income disparities widening for racialized groups, Indigenous peoples, and women

Bottom Line

Alberta is making measurable progress, but sustaining long-term prosperity will require stronger productivity growth, broad-based workforce participation, and investment in enabling infrastructure.



MEMBER ENGAGEMENT

In 2025, the BCA grew in depth, expertise, and engagement and was honoured to welcome **11 new companies** for a total of **142 Council Members**.

In the past year, we hosted **more than 15 member engagements**, including roundtables with Ministers and senior government officials at both the provincial and federal levels, as well as advocacy trips to Edmonton and Ottawa.

A series of focused reviews on Alberta's investment and competitiveness landscape will examine fiscal and tax policy, regulatory approvals, sector strategies, and labour force development.

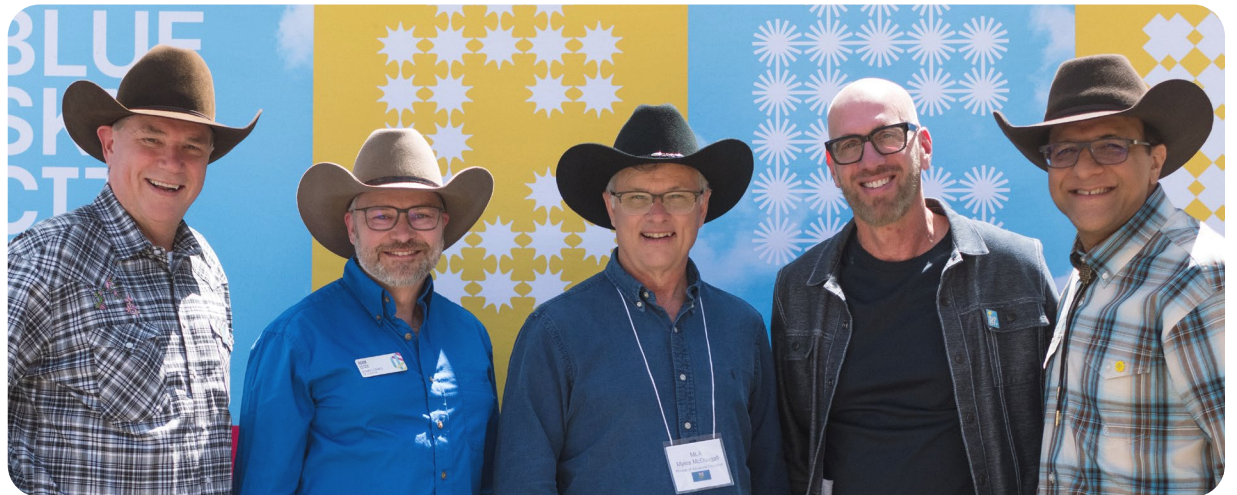
Championing Alberta at the National Level
